“Voting! I’m Excited” LWV Team Visits Templeton High

The quote above came from a senior at Templeton High School and attests to the fact that Youth Voter Registration is going strong in the 2017–2018 school year. This effort to encourage young people to register to vote began in the spring of this year when the League of

Women Voters of San Luis Obispo County was one of 20 regional Leagues in the United States to receive a national LWV grant to reach out to high school

students with information about voter registration.

We developed a presentation that includes the history of the League, the struggles for voting rights, information about voter registration, and lists of resources available about how to become an informed voter. The presentation especially highlights the information available on Voters’ Edge at <http://votersedge.org/ca>, a Web site sponsored by the California State League of Women Voters which presents condensed financial data about candidates and ballot measures.

After the presentation, students are given an opportunity to complete voter registration forms, to provide feedback about the presentation, and to sign pledge cards saying they will vote in future elections. Team members answer questions and review vot-

er registration forms to ensure the students have completed all necessary fields. So far this year the dedicated team of volunteers has spoken to 590 students at six of

our area high schools. More than 70% of the students have completed registration forms! As we near the 2018 elections, we would predict that a greater percentage of the students will take this important step toward becoming a voter.

At these presentations the students have been engaged, and we have received great feedback. One student said she hoped that this presentation is given to high schools all over the country. Another said, “This was a super interesting presentation! I can’t wait to be able to vote!”

Engaging our youth is exactly what we were hoping to accomplish. We would love to have you join us as we move into the winter and spring of 2018. If you are interested, please contact me at julie0513@sbcglobal.net.

Letter to the Editor

The following letter to the editor was published in the Tribune in August. SB 10 was subsequently tabled and will be revived in 2018. The Senate and Assembly were unable to reconcile their differences, and Governor Brown announced that the measure would be held as lawmakers and court officials continue their negotiations. We are following the issue and will let members know when the time is right to contact Assemblyman Cunningham to ask for his support.

To the Editor:

The League of Women Voters urges support for SB 10 which seeks to fix California's broken bail system. Currently 46,000 Californians are in county jails because they cannot make bail. While wealthy defendants can secure their own release, poor defendants cannot. Poor Californians are sitting in jail for weeks, months, even years awaiting trial, all the while at risk of losing their jobs, their homes, and even their children.

SB 10 prioritizes public safety by instructing counties to institute a risk assessment protocol to determine if an individual is a threat to society or a flight risk, to release low-risk suspects without conditions or with non-monetary conditions (such as home monitoring), and to maintain the use of bail when appropriate, but set bail at a rate that will ensure a return to court.

Releasing low-risk defendants pending trial is just plain fair. It

League Calls for CalSTRS to Divest from Illegal Weapons Companies

The League of Women Voters of California supports State Treasurer John Chiang's proposal that



the California State Teachers Retirement System divest from companies that deal in weapons that are illegal to own or sell in California.

Big Wins! California Legislative Wrap-up Report from LWVC

The 2017 California legislative session is a wrap, and thanks to supporters like you, we have new laws addressing many of the critical issues we face in California.

Because so many of you took action, we're celebrating major legislative victories:

We're celebrating major legislative victories!

- The California Values Act passed, ensuring state and local resources are not being used to fuel mass deportations, destroy families, and cripple our economy.
- The passage of SB 2 and SB 3 will generate about \$5 billion for more affordable housing over the next five years.
- Campaign ads will have to identify their big money donors prominently on tv, radio, online, and in print with the passage of the Disclose Act.
- Community college students will be assessed more fairly, creating a clearer path to success and preventing them from being tracked into unnecessary non-credit remedial classes thanks to AB 705.
- The passage of AB 918 means the millions of voters with limited English skills will have access to more information in their language, including facsimile ballots—a critical step in ensuring all voices are heard on election day.

In addition to the many action alerts we have sent, the League was also advocating for other bills at the Capitol. This year, Governor Brown signed ALL of the bills supported by the League that came across his desk! California now has 27 new League-approved laws, improving California's policies on the environment, education, voting rights, and more.

Unfortunately, our efforts to reform California's broken bail system were stalled, but we'll have another chance to fix that when SB 10 is taken up again next year. We're also looking forward to ongoing efforts to address the housing shortage and progress on key higher education bills. The League is also ready to take action on campaign finance reform and any legislative responses to new federal activity.

Financial Review Report for FY 2016-17

At the League Board meeting on November 3, 2017, **Janice Carr**, Chair of the Financial Review Committee, presented the Financial Review Report for fiscal year 2016 – 2017. The Board received the report, noting the League can be assured that the financial statements and management of fiscal matters are satisfactory and in accordance with accounting standards. The Board is required by our Bylaws to report the results of the review to our membership within 150 days of the end of the fiscal year on June 30. The full report is available to members upon request. The Committee reported as follows:

“We have reviewed the accompanying statement of assets, liabilities and equity – cash basis, of LWVSLO (a nonprofit organization) as of June 30, 2017, and the related statement of revenue, and expenses – cash basis, for the year then ended. Our review included applying analytical procedures to management’s financial data and making inquiries of organization management. We conducted our review in accordance with Statements on Standards for Accounting and Review Services issued by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. Those standards require the performance of procedures to obtain limited assurance that there are no material modifications that should be made to the financial statements. We believe that the results of our procedures provide a reasonable basis for our report. Based on our review, we are not aware of any material modifications that should be made to the accompanying financial statements for them to be in conformity with the cash basis of accounting.”

Bishop Street Studios Is Set to Break Ground in Spring 2018

Bishop Street Studios focuses on adaptive reuse and rehabilitation of the Historic Sunny Acres building above Johnson Avenue and will feature a community room, offices, and supportive services to persons with mental illness. The project received significant public funding from a variety of sources and received support from various local governments and community organizations. The project will provide permanent supportive housing for 33 people with mental illness or recovery issues. It includes an on-site manager and on-site services. This project represents hope, growth, and security.

Our League Board voted to support the Bishop Street Studios project that is a partnership between Transitions-Mental Health Association



(TMHA) and Housing Authority San Luis Obispo (HASLO). Our League wrote a Letter to the Editor in support of this project and spoke at a Board of Supervisors meeting. We based our support on the state position on Mental Health and our local Public Health position which included mental health services as part of an integrated and comprehensive

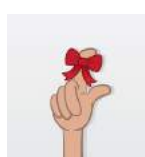
Your League nominating committee is very interested in hearing from you this December. Shortly you will be receiving an email with a link to an online survey about your interests and availability for the coming year.

lessens the burden on our jails, keeps families from falling deeper into poverty, and ensures that defendants who want to plead not-guilty at trial are not pressured into pleading guilty to a low-level felony just so they can return home. SB 10 has passed the state Senate. We ask everyone concerned about the injustice of our bail system to contact Assemblyman Jordan Cunningham and urge him to support SB 10.
